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MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY

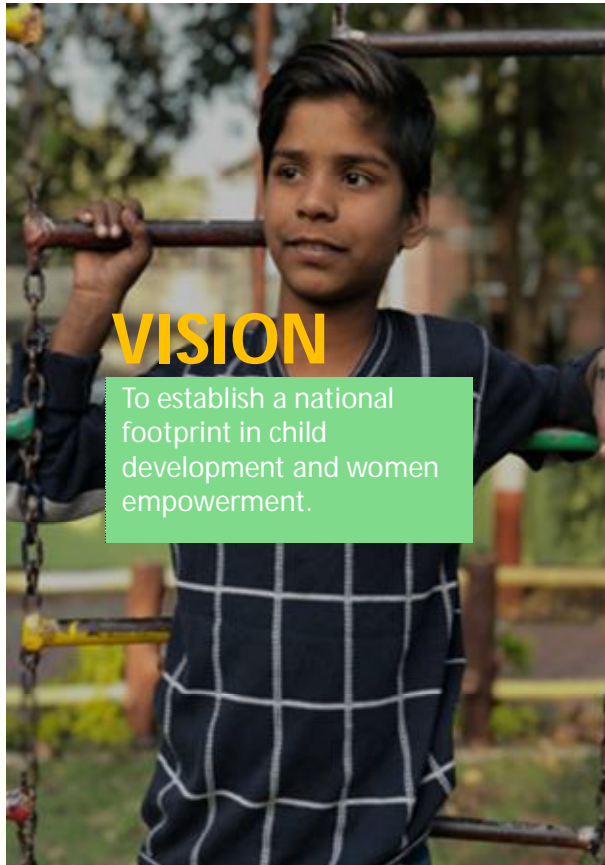

ABOUT AAS

AAS - which in Hindi means “Hope”- was incorporated in May 2005 to establish the hope for positive change in the society. It was initiated by seven like-minded youths, in Indore, Madhya Pradesh with an aim to spread awareness towards diverse social problems. On 05-05-2005, this informal group registered itself as a not for profit organization under Madhya Pradesh Societies Registration Act with Name “AAS–Aim for the Awareness of society”. (Registration No: 03/27/3/0431/05)

AAS is also registered under FCRA, 12A and 80G. AAS believes to work with a theme of Knowledge and Resource partnership. It runs different projects in close coordination with different government departments such as Indore Police, Municipal Corporation, Labour Department, Women and Child Development Department etc. These stakeholders lend a hand towards maintaining credibility in all the projects of the organization. Organization initiated its interventions in year 2005 by creating awareness on HIV/AIDS, Drug De-addiction and water and sanitation. After three years we realized that children and women in the community are the major stakeholder who face vulnerabilities in various areas. Therefore we decided to target women and children for our each and every interventions. At the same time, we have been working on environment, health and safety related issues for the society.

OBJECTIVES OF AAS

- To associate with different government schemes for the improvement of Schedule Castes and Tribes, women, children and other deprived sections of the society.
- To conduct awareness programs in rural and urban areas to improve physical and mental health of people.
- To establish linkages with health department for imparting health services to the vulnerable.
- To spread awareness and understanding about our fundamental rights and fundamental duties.
- To develop and demonstrate sustainable systems for the environment, sanitation and waste recycling.
- To carry out studies and research in relevant fields to understand and evolve effective strategies for better governance and development.

- To work for communal harmony in the society.
- To work for rehabilitation of physically or mentally disadvantaged, female sex workers and other marginalized groups of society.
- To build sustainable livelihood, resources, infrastructure and enhance accessibility to the resources for poor communities.
- To develop self-help groups in urban and rural areas for ensuring saving habits and discover different livelihood options for economic development.

CURRENT PROJECTS

1. CHILD DEVELOPMENT

1.1. CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE is a national 24-hour free phone emergency outreach service for children in need of care and protection. The phone number 1098 (toll free), responds to needs of children by providing emergency assistance and linking them to specific resource organizations for long term rehabilitation services with planned follow-ups. Thus, it assists the child to fight with the difficult circumstances of her/his life. With the help of CHILDLINE, it has become possible to lay the foundation for proper psychological, physical and social development of the children. CHILDLINE has helped in achieving co-ordination of policy and implementation amongst the various departments to promote child development. CHILDLINE works with children in need of care and protection with the view to ensure their basic right. Usually it works with children up to 18 years of age but in special circumstances it also assists girls and boys of up to 25 years of age.

CHILDLINE team deals with various types of cases so as to make the community child friendly. It majorly classifies its operations into three categories as:

INTERVENTION

Childline first gathers information about the cases from the caller, checks the authenticity of the information and then intervenes if they find the case details to be authentic. Childline rescues the child from the unsuitable condition and also provides him/her proper counselling. During intervention, Childline also takes the help from local authorities and government departments.

AWARENESS

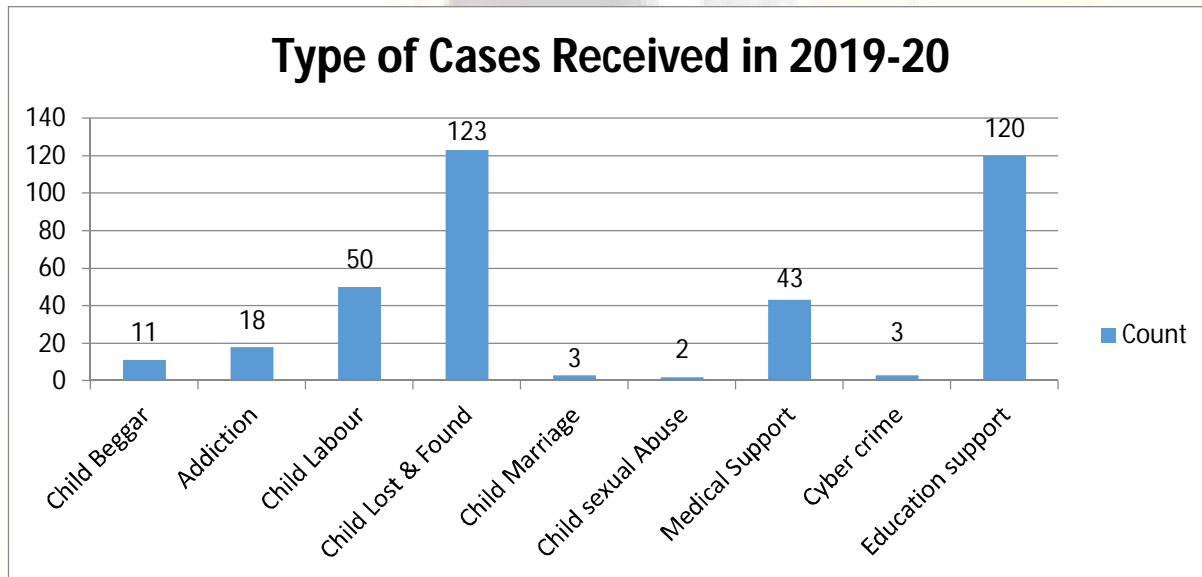
Childline conducts a range of awareness programs in slums, schools, communities etc. It takes the help of its volunteers and spreads awareness through posters, skits, marathons etc. Childline thinks that creating Awareness among people is very important in order to curb the injustice being done against children. AAS has recently come across a case where people who have reported child abuse, were the ones made aware through awareness campaigns conducted by Childline.

ADVOCACY

Childline also makes advocacy efforts to sensitize government and non-government departments for the child protection issues. AAS organized a range of rescue operations for child begging, child labour and child marriage with the help of advocacy efforts with government. A very first child beggar task force formed in Indore by the district collector due to our active advocacy efforts.

CHILDLINE Indore Statistics:

AAS initiated Childline project in Dec 2011 in Indore. Till March 2020, total 6853 cases have been registered. In the financial year 2019-20, total 1204 cases have been registered. The type of cases registered in this year is shown in the table and graph given below.



CHILDLINE se Dosti:

On 19th November AAS organization held an event for the welfare of the students by the name of 'childline se dosti'. This was a social event and the purpose of the event was to make children's aware of their rights and about childcare helpline. This event covered major issues of child like child labour and child begging. The event was witnessed by around 200 students from different parts of the city like Khajrana square, M.I.G colony, Bhawarkuwa Square. Mrs. Ruchi Vardhan Singh Mishr(D.I.G of Indore) was the chief guest of the event.

The event started enthusiastically. People were welcomed by putting a red tika on forehead and giving them a band of childcare this was followed by the lighting of the lamp in the name of goddess Saraswati. After this Mr. Wasim Iqbal conducted an activity in which the students were asked to share their views of changes they want in our society by writing on a sticky notes and pasting it on the sheet designed as a tree. The purpose of this activity was to look at the society from children's prospective. After this a dance performance was performed by the students of different age group which was followed by nukkad natak. The topic for nukkad natak was child labour. A special dance performance was given by children of Balmitra Thana and Sanjivani Sanstha. Students of I.S.S.B School also performed a nukkad natak. After this Ms.Pooja Ahirwad took a session on self defense and yoga. In this session students were taught different self defense moves and assanas. After this chief guest Mrs. Ruchi Vardhan Singh Mishr(D.I.G of Indore) gave a speech on Childline , child labour and initiatives taken by government to stop child begging.



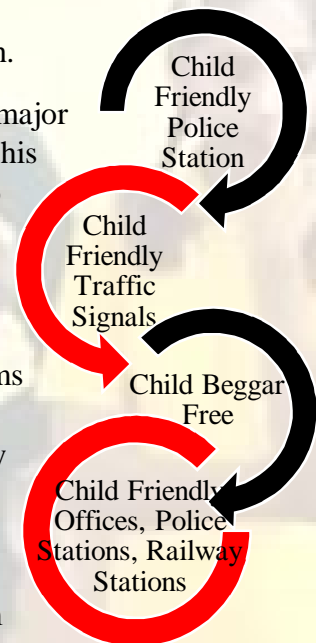
1.1. The Way Forward

We intend to build Indore into a child friendly city. We have charted out a step by step approach to automatically achieve this goal i.e. by building-

Finally achieving a child friendly city and eventually a child friendly nation.

In our view, child labour, child sexual abuse and child begging are the major problems faced by kids. Our aim for the next year would be to curb this problem in a huge way and have a target base of at least 50000 kids. To execute the same we aim to:

- Provide requisite training to the kids and other stakeholders associated to the issues.
- Conduct an action research to understand the core of the problems and seek support from organizations on the same.
- Come up with campaigns solely targeting child friendly environment.
- Innovate: Creating videos and creative games to enhance the impact of the efforts.
- Seek help from senior citizens of Indore city by encouraging them to volunteer.
- Establish 10 more child friendly police stations.



2. PROJECT SEWA (MANGLIA, BARWAH & GHATABILOD)

AAS has associated itself with Shree Mahadeo Shakra Trust for the implementation of child development projects at Manglia area, Indore. It has identified about 50 children consisting of 25 boys and 25 girls in four villages who are brought up by single parent or belong to below poverty line families. These children were selected with the help of an intensive need assessment

exercise conducted by AAS. Care is taken for the holistic development of children by concentrating on their health, Nutrition, Education and Skill Development.

AAS has also started the same project in Ghatabilod area where they are supporting 50 more children on the same lines. The process followed for selecting the students is the same. In the initial phase, the response received from the children was more than satisfactory which motivates the entire team to work more diligently.

The have also started this project a year back in Barwah, where 25 girls and 25 boys are going through these assessment exercise. Organisation is expecting a similar response which they received from the other two locations, so far the entire program and schedule has been smooth.

There was a girl in the Ghatabilod project which was quite reserved and under confident in front of other students and teachers but after speaking to her parents we realised that she is lot more comfortable and outspoken with her friends and family. She spoke to 2-3 teachers but the hesitation was still there. Finally, one of the teachers from the school tried to be friends with her and then tried to understand her emotions, this strategy worked well as now she was confident enough to share her stories with the class and was able to take her stand whenever required

3. PROJECT SANTA

The Project Santa is a project in which our team identifies the most vulnerable people specially children in the community. These children are school dropout, child beggars, child labors and victims of various types of abuse. We study case to case requirement of these children and share with our individual donors called “SANTA”. These Santas helps us in different ways i.e. providing monthly or yearly financial contribution. They can also directly connect with the children if they wish to understand their needs and support them accordingly. Currently we have 3 Santa throughout the city namely Dr. R.K. Gupta, Ms. Ayushi and Ms. Kusum Sharma.

AAS Indore is planning to add 100+ SANTA this year throughout the city. The sole purpose of the project is to provide happiness to children therefore the SANTA can contribute in any of the way which is possible for them.

4. PROJECT JAGRIK

Jagrik is wordplay and a concept that combines Jagruk (Awakened and Aware) and Nagrik (Citizen). The Jagriks act as active citizens for the jag (communities). The motive of this initiative is to make each and every student more responsible about their fundamental rights and duties and to prevent awareness about the same. AAS Indore in collaboration with Community youth collective has started a project for SAMVIDHAN JAGRIK which is overviewed by UNICEF. In this project our organisation is working in Dhar District. The project requires us to

enlighten more than 250 children in the region. During the project we share the knowledge of fundamental rights and fundamental duties with the children through some fun activities, stories and games. 'Jagriks' play this interactive game in pairs over five weeks and undertake tasks which are both self-reflective and social in nature. On completing their weekly tasks, the 'Jagriks' come together to share their learning in weekly meetings called 'Jamghats'. The program has initial 2 days as orientation after which the students are required to fill the pre survey form. To check the progress of each individual we conduct a post survey at the end of the course in which we identify the growth and gaps of each student. So far we have educated more than 100 children through SamvidhanJagrik while more than 45 students are enrolled in our ongoing project for the same. We also look forward to increase this number to 300 by the end of 2020-2021. Simultaneously 'Jagriks' post their experiences and learning through videos, stories and pictures on a dedicated Facebook page 'Be a Jagrik!'.

Insights:

Task:

During one of the tasks, few students were asked to observe the situation of children within the house. Initially, people were reluctant to allow them to get inside their houses but after requesting them rigorously they got through it. They shared their experience from different places where at the first place they saw that the parents were reluctant to send their daughters outside to play with other kids. In the second house they observed that there is a vast difference in which the girls and boys were treated. In the next house they saw that there was a male dominant environment and the girls in the house were getting harassed even on small things. Few of them felt familiar to these situations while others were totally unaware of these.

Impact:

Discrimination and child abuse is a negative yet strongly existent part of our society. Through this task the students were made aware about the sort of discrimination and the extent to which it is there in our society. After understanding the entire situation they also went to the child right organisation within the village and requested them to overview and resolve these issues on priority.

5. PROJECT SAFE CHILDHOOD

ACG Cares Foundation, in association with AAS Indore, understands the pressing need to establish child friendly schools and equip school-going children with information about pertinent issues like gender discrimination, self-defence, cyber security and menstrual hygiene.

Two schools in Sagore, Pithampur were identified for the project. It was realized during the recce that the children in both the girls' and boys' school were in need of education about child rights, safe and unsafe touch and menstrual hygiene.

Around 1500 kids across classes and both schools underwent training on these issues through the sessions organised and implemented by AAS.

6. PROJECT PARENT ENGAGEMENT

Parenthood is probably the most selfless profession in the world, with every action aimed at making your child's life better. But, however altruistic the intentions are, it is important that the impact of the actions yield the desired fruits.

Beginning in July 2019, the sessions conducted by AAS were aimed at ensuring that parenting styles evolved in a manner to provide a safe, nurturing environment to enable their dreams to take flight. The sessions began with an introduction to the three organisations, providing credibility to the speakers and the content of the seminar. With the help of Eric Ericsson's study, the parents were explained the different stages of a child's development from the time(s)he is born, till (s)he attains maturity. It was elucidated that each stage is characterised by different tendencies and behaviour in children, and therefore must be met with a parenting style in tandem to the child's need. It was stressed that what the child needs is open communication. For the overall development of children, a two-way communication between parents and children is of utmost importance. The parents were shown movies to drive home the importance of healthy communication with children. The importance of spending some quality time with the children was highlighted. The parents were also told about the importance of explaining the difference between good touch and bad touch to their children from an early age. It was communicated to them that they must encourage healthy dialogue with children and encourage them to openly talk about their feelings. The parents were also told that each child is born with an individual personality and set of abilities, and should be appreciated for the same instead of being compared with other children.

A journey that began in July 2019, spanning across 50 schools and 1000 parents was a definite success in terms of the objectives achieved. Through the innovative stories and movies that were shown, it helped the parents understand that parenting needs to be a conscious effort. For a child to truly develop wings to their dreams, good parenting is an absolute must. Parents understood the importance of spending quality time with children, establishing an environment of positive communication and fostering each child's own abilities.

The organization felt that this is the first program in itself which is positively motivated parents for child development. Such programs need to be conducted on a regular basis. The organization has realized a need of parent resource center in Indore and initiated a "Parent resource center" which will be provided support to the parents every day during 3:00 to 5:00. Through this resource center, all the parents who want support in parenting, may visit to the organization or can call during the specified hours for the guidance and support on parenting. The organization is also developing a Module on "Parenting" with the guidance and support from Opportunity international. This module will be helpful as a tool for the likeminded organizations who want to work on parenting

7. HEALTH

7.1. BLOOD DONATION

Blood has played a central role in the development of many aspects of our culture, folklore, spirituality, and religion. Blood is not only vital to life but also complex and downright frightening when it ceases to function normally. So while you may never worry about having enough blood to function, plenty of others aren't as fortunate. Many of those who cannot afford blood have to give up on their lives due to this. Doing well for others is one way to live a longer life. Hence, AAS every year organizes a blood donation camp where donors from all walks of life come and donate blood for those who truly need it. AAS also facilitate blood seekers with the donors and hundreds of lives are saved every year because of such initiatives. It helps in bridging the gap between service providers and service seekers. The benefits are majorly targeted towards women and children who especially travel to Indore to get their treatment done. This year total 10 patients have been facilitated with donors for the blood. AAS would like to express gratitude to all the donors who support us for the blood donations.

International Yoga Day:

On the occasion of Yoga day on 21 June 2019 a program to enhance Yoga among people of various age groups was organised by AAS at Gatabillod.

Mr. Shambhu nath ji came with an idea to conduct a program on Yoga day. With the help of Community member of National steel company Gatabillod the program was organised. Workers of national colony with their family attended the campaign and showed their interest by participating in various yoga activities.

A Yoga instructor was appointed Vishal joshi to teach various yoga steps and importance of yoga. He introduced them with various yoga positions and perks of yoga. He taught them the effects of yoga on one's health and also ways of performing yoga.

They performed some yoga exercise as instructed by Mr. Vishal. Some questions were also asked by the community members in short they actively participated in the program. Small girls also performed dance to show various yoga positions.



CAMPAIGNS

8. MASTI KI PATHSHALA

In March 2012, AAS initiated the concept of “Masti ki Pathshala” for deprived children. The campaign is completing its Eight years now. The main aim of this campaign is to target children from the deprived sections who are school dropouts and engaged in economic activities. Currently we have started these sessions in three venues in Indore. Each venue has around 40 students which are the part of evening classes conducted regularly.

Main Objectives

- To develop capacity of children in participatory and pedagogy approach.
- To convert their negative energies into positive energies through life skills and physical activities like yoga, sports and dance.
- To educate them about hygiene and cleanliness
- To develop children as responsible citizens.
- To make them conscious about child labor, drug intake, harassment and similar issues.
- To train them to protect themselves in difficult/ vulnerable environment.
- To demonstrate the importance of education and skill development for future pursuits.
- To build their (especially girls) capacity by providing vocational or occupational training.



All the identified children first provided opportunity to play in the premises of AAS. After the reasonable rapport establishment, AAS initiated the series of informal education on a daily basis. Children used to come to the AAS office every day in the evening during 4:30 to 6:30 and participated in various sessions like hygiene, child protection, safe and unsafe touch etc. all these trainings were conducted by the volunteers under the observation of the organization. In every phase the team selected some major areas and identified 30 – 40 children. They were motivated to come and play games, sports and other recreational activities for two hours in evening.

Sometimes movies, cartoons etc. are also shown to children to educate them about children issues.

Now this project is under its Fifth phase and is running very successfully by fulfilling all the aims with which it was started. Till date about 500 children got benefited with the help of these classes.

Expansion plans

- Designing a module to understand and develop WHO's 10 core life skills.
- We also intend to extend this program's benefits to near about 5 communities.
- Keeping a target of 250 more kids.

9. AWARENESS EVENTS

AAS organized different school awareness sessions for addressing child sexual abuse in Indore. All the training sessions were covered important sessions like child rights and child sexual abuse. The training program contained presentations, a movie to make children aware about safe and unsafe touch.

The primary objective of these events was to help children differentiate between 'safe touch' and 'unsafe touch'. AAS representatives also made efforts to sensitize school teachers to develop their schools friendly for children so that children in case of any hard situation can report to their concerned teachers. The main target of the event was to cover schools, shelter homes or any other child care institute under its umbrella. A total of 143 sessions covering around 8124 children were held this year.

Campaign for Safe and Unsafe touch:

In the program Mrs Sandhya Vyas, joint director of WCD was invited as chief guest. And other honourable guests are Mr. Rajneesh Sinha -sub-director(WCD), Mr. Rakesh Wankhede (WCD), Mr. Bhagwandas Sahu – Child protection officer(ICPS-WCD), Mr. V.S. Rathore-assistant director (WCD).

The objectives of the program are:

- To reach more & more children and women to aware them about safe and unsafe touch.
- To train CDPOs, aanganwadi supervisor and aanganwadi workers so that they can train other workers, so we can expand this program on a large scale.

To involve all the organization so they can provide training. In the program Joint director officer (WCD) formed a cell of workers and gave them movies and other awareness stuff in pen drive for long term access.



After that Rajneesh Sinha sir asked everyone to work together for Social interest. He also informed that, so many juvenile cases are coming under Sec 302 and Sec 376 in almost every 15 days.

At last director of AAS Mr. Wasim Iqbal sir urged that everyone should save children in their own sectors. He said that The UNCRC defines the child as a person under 18 years of age.

Awareness for Childline:

On 27 May 19 the Childline team in collaboration with the RPF (Railway Protection Force) Indore organized an awareness campaign at Indore railway station. The main objective of the awareness campaign was to sensitise railway commuters about the Child line number 1098 and its functions. The Childline team also made several posters on various rights of the children as entitled to by the government of India, these rights includes protection from child labour, child marriage and child exploitation.

The drive was a success as it imparted a large number of travellers and various stakeholders like coolies, vendors and security people about the role and function of Childline and the national helpline number 1098 in case of any child in need. Passengers inside the train coaches were also informed of the helpline number as railway station is one place where the children are most vulnerable to being lost in crowd, exploitation and beggary. Railway station is also a major transit point for child trafficking.



10. ADVOCACY INITIATIVES

Every year AAS make efforts to sensitize district administration on various issues related to child protection. This year too, AAS represented in various forums and shared different challenges faces by the deprived children in the city.

AAS is working on the reservation rights of orphan children as the provision currently exists only in Maharashtra. AAS is trying to replicate something similar in Madhya Pradesh.

AAS was also a part of the UNICEF workshop conducted on [REDACTED] which was aimed to target the alternative care topic which mainly focuses on sending those children who cannot provide adequate care to their extended families, foster care or through adoption to other families. At present, Madhya Pradesh government is planning to spread the knowledge and awareness about this program by organising various events. They will also provide resources to carry forward this program in a better way.

11. AFTER CARE SERVICES

AAS is working for students to provide them after care services that is, AAS helps the students to bring them on a ground which is at the same level as the outer world. The children after reaching the age of 18 has to leave the NGO but in most cases they are not prepared to cope up with the external world. AAS provides them a platform to prepare them for this scenario.

Currently, there are 6-7 students enrolled in this program. AAS is helping one of them to pursue his graduation as per their preference while the other one has enrolled herself for self defence classes. English speaking and personality development classes are held for all of them. The children enrolled are participating enthusiastically in all the events and there is a clear sign of positive change in their personality and attitude.

12. TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING

In the training program AAS sanstha Indore has educated its major stakeholders that is Police officers, school principals, Anganwadi workers, CDPOs and child welfare officers on some major key areas including POCSO, JJ, Childrights and Child friendly institution. The sole purpose of the program was to educate the authorities who remains in direct touch with the students. Various training building events were conducted which includes:

Roadside Events:

Through the roadside events and flashmob, AAS Indore highlighted some key areas including menstrual hygiene, women empowerment, right to equality, helthier tomorrow etc. People were

voluntarily participating in these events which made it a huge success for the audience as well as the performers and the message was sent loud and clear to everyone present there.

AAS Indore organized a programme on awareness and advocacy of menstrual hygiene at main gate of Rajwada, Indore, on 28th May 2019. The programme started at 4 PM; we had created different banners, posters which were displaying slogans and messages about social stigmas and taboos associated with menstruation among women and society in general. The vision and mission of the programme was to create a world in which every woman and girl is empowered to



manage her menstruation safely, hygienically, with confidence and without any hesitation as girls are limited by some things as natural and normal as period.

13. LEGAL AWARENESS

AAS Sanstha Indore is spreading legal awareness with the help of Dr. R. K. Gupta. The program is designed to educate all the women in need of legal advice or in general awareness. Daily sessions are conducted from 3-5 PM where Mr. Gupta shares the insights about legal awareness and resolves individual queries. The motive of the program is to make sure that every woman associated with the program be it directly or indirectly, are well aware of their legal rights.

So far number of women have been educated about legal awareness through these sessions.
